Biography

This month I had the pleasure to interview our own Lewis Maddox. Lewis will be 94 years old on April 13, 2005. Lewis joined the Marine Corps when he was 19 years old in 1950. I asked him, "why did you join the Military?" He said he joined because of the Koren War!

Lewis trained in Parris Island; after training he was sent to Camp Pendleton, where he was sent to Korea. Lewis was a Gun Captain in 1952 in North Korea. He was in the 14th Marine Air Group in Japan and was involved in the Formosa (Taiwan Straits) crisis.

I asked him what was his most memorable part of his service. "Travel" Lewis told me he got to travel all over Europe and the Mediterranean and "didn't have to pay anything like the Tourists", he said with a smile. He's, been to Mt. Fuji in Japan, where they had an airstrip set up like an aircraft carrier and they practiced how to hook planes. 'There were no Jets back then" he said with a twinkle in his eye, "Just Prop Planes". He loved to watch them practice! He told me he's been to Austria, Rome and Venice, Italy. I was told that he has a picture of himself holding up the Leaning Tower of Pisa (I'll try to get a copy and post here) and that the only way to ring the bell was to use a pole and knock it because it leaned so much that the bell was ineffective. He has also been to Edenton, England, Paris, France and spent four months in Germany. Sounds like Lewis is a well traveled Man!

My Next question to Lewis was "what are somethings you didn't like?" not wanting him to talk about what he and the other Marines actually did in the War, I said maybe something that made you uncomfortable. He shared with me that his time in the Chosin Reservoir in North Korea was probably the worst possible weather, and he became cold intolerant because of his time there. He said they didn't have cold weather gear like the Marines of today. They only had light jackets. I read up on the Battle of the Chosin Reservoir, it was brutal! General Mac Arthur described the area as a "merciless wasteland, locked in a silent death grip of snow and Ice. At the end of the Battle the Marines suffered 750 dead and 3,000 wounded and cause more than 42,000 enemy casualties, which cost the Chinese Ninth Army group two divisions and rendering it ineffective as a fighting force! Lewis told me that the snow and Ice was so bad that there are still missing in action buried up there to this day.




